- Rosh Hashanah- celebration of the Jewish New Year,
- Yom Kippur-is the "Day of Atonement" and refers to the annual Jewish observance of fasting, prayer and repentance. This is considered to be the holiest day in the Jewish calendar.
- Sukkot-refers to the festival of giving thanks for the fall harvest, as well as the commemoration of the huts the Jews lived in while wandering in the desert after Sinai
- Shemini Atzeret-means "Eighth Day of Solemn Assembly" and is celebrated at the end of Sukkot.
- · Simchat Torah- means "rejoicing in the Law" and celebrates the completion of the annual reading of the Torah
- Chanukah- The modern home celebration of Chanukah centers around the lighting of the chanukiah, a special menorah for Chanukah.
- Tu B'Shevat-or the "New Year of the Trees" is Jewish Arbor Day. The holiday is observed on the fifteenth (tu) of Sh'vat.
- Purim- celebrated by the reading of the Scroll of Esther (the story of Purim). The reading of the megillah is punctuated by booing and noise-making when Haman's name is read aloud.
- Passover is a major Jewish spring festival. The ritual observance of this holiday centers around a special home service called the seder meaning "order", and a festive meal; the prohibition of chametz (leaven); and the eating of matzah (an unleavened bread).
- Yom HaShoah -Holocaust Remembrance Day.
- Yom HaZikaron-Israeli Fallen Soldiers and Victims of Terrorism Remembrance Day and is Israel's official Memorial Day.
- Yom Ha'atzmaut- Israeli Independence Day, marks the establishment of the modern state of Israel in 1948. It is observed on the 5th of Iyar in the Hebrew calendar, which usually falls in April.
- Lag Ba'Omer- It is celebrated to commemorate the day a plague ended in which thousands of students of Rabbi Akiba, a Talmudic scholar had perished.
- Shavuot- began as an ancient agricultural festival, marking the end of the spring barley harvest and the beginning of the summer wheat harvest.
- Tisha B'Av-refers to a traditional day of mourning the destruction of both ancient Temples in Jerusalem
- Tu B'Av-refers to the Jewish day of love.

Then the Lord said: Listen, Moses,

This very night about midnight,
I'll pass over Egypt land,

And a cry went up out of Egypt.

And Pharoah rose in the middle of the night
And he sent in a hurry for Moses;

And he said: Go forth among my people,

You and all the Hebrew children;

Take your goods and take your flocks,

And get away from the land of Egypt.

And, right then, Moses led them out,
With all their goods and all their flocks;
And God went on before,
A guiding pillar of cloud by day,
And a pillar of fire by night.
And they journeyed on in the wilderness,
And came down to the Red Sea.

Quoting the Bible's Old Testament, Washington wrote, every one shall sit in safety under his own vine and fig-tree and there shall be none to make him afraid. He continues: "For happily the Government of the United States gives to bigotry no sanction, to persecution no assistance, requires only that they who live under its protection should demean themselves as good citizens, in giving it on all occasions their effectual support."

So deeply ingrained was the Hebrew Biblical narrative in the minds of the Founding Fathers and Mothers of this country that at the conclusion of the American Revolution in 1783, there was a debate among the American leadership over what was going to be the great seal of the United States of America. There were some American leaders who thought it should be the American bald eagle. But there was another group of American leaders who said no, the image of the United States should show Moses leading the children of Israel out of the Promised Land - out of bondage and into the Promised Land. There was a very intense debate about this over the seal, and America came this close to having Moses as its national symbol. Moses lost out, alas, to the follicly-challenged bird. But you should know that the designers of the Moses seal were none other than Thomas Jefferson and Benjamin Franklin. That's how deeply they had internalized the Biblical Hebrew narrative.
